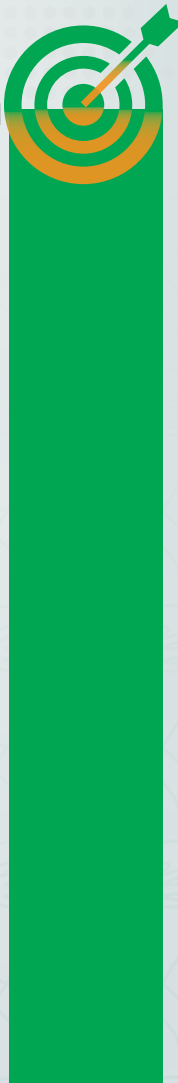

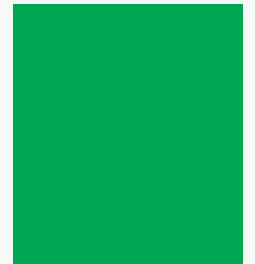

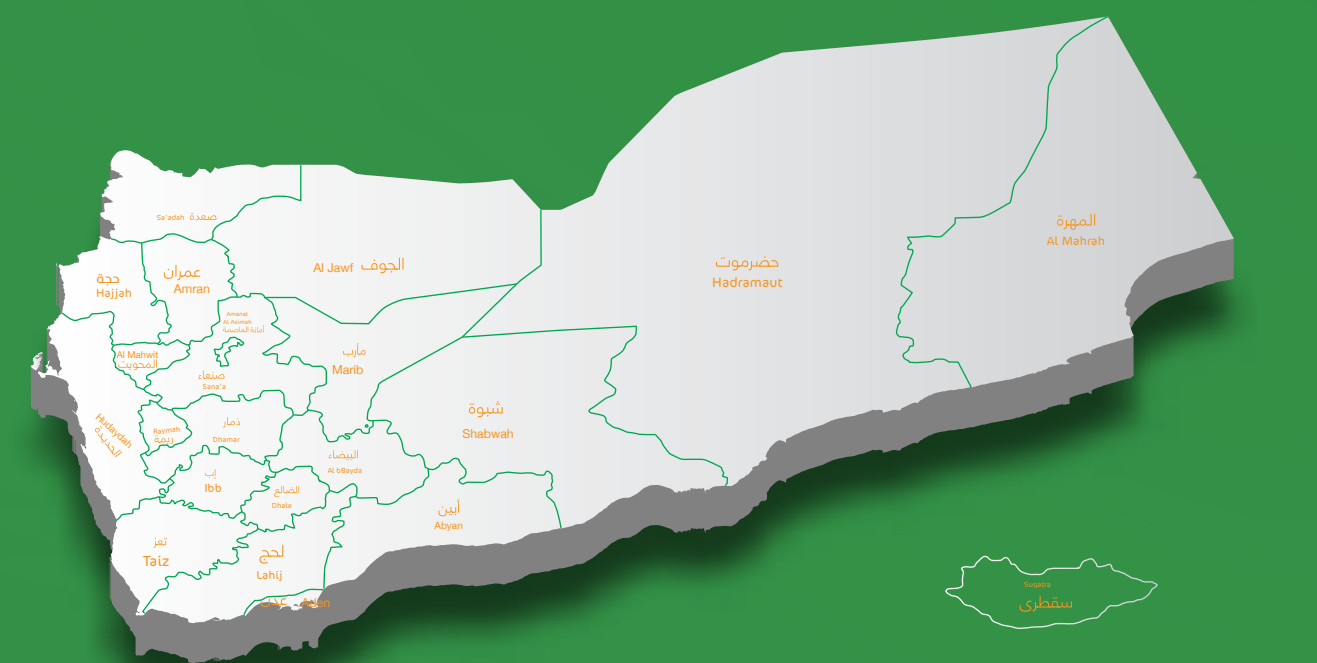


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# Executive Summary

## A Decade of Relief and Development

**This report presents ten years** of humanitarian and development efforts undertaken by CRB across various governorates in Yemen. The strategic focus has centered on two core objectives: immediate response to urgent needs and laying the foundations for sustainable development and economic empowerment. Key intervention sectors include food security, shelter and non-food items, water and sanitation, health, education, and others.

**Over these years,** CRB has implemented emergency and seasonal projects such as cash and food assistance and seasonal initiatives during Ramadan and Eid Al-Adha. Moreover, sustainable projects aimed at infrastructure improvement and livelihood development have been carried out, including housing and camp establishment, well drilling and water network installation, and economic empowerment programs for the most vulnerable.

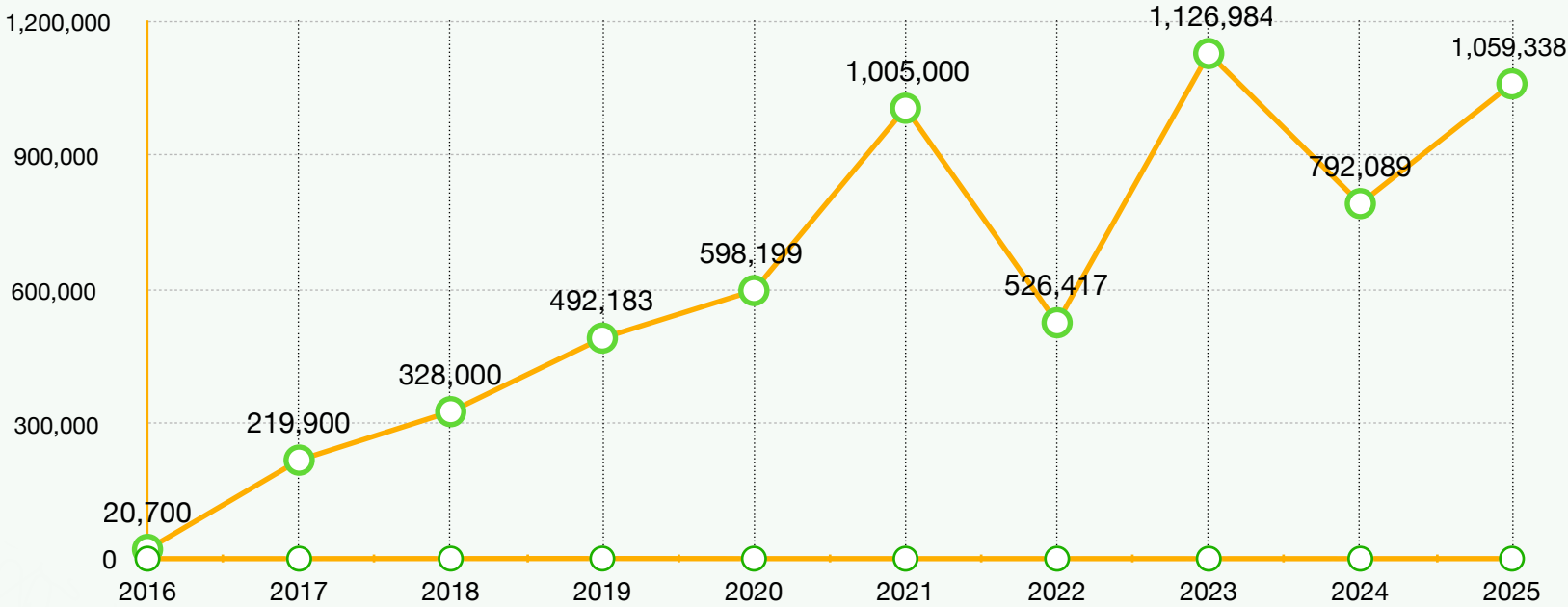
**Throughout the past decade,** CRB implemented more than 672 humanitarian and development projects, covering 19 Yemeni governorates. These interventions benefited over 6,169,805 individuals, because of generous funding from local, regional, and international sources.

CRB also strengthened its institutional and strategic partner-

ships, expanding membership, and actively participating in national and international coalitions and networks. This strategic positioning has multiplied the impact of CRB’s interventions and enabled effective coordination with other actors, detailed further in the “Institutional Development and Partnerships” section.

### The past decade has been distinguished by a strategic approach grounded on the following pillars:

- Continuous expansion to cover new governorates and communities, ensuring support reaches the most deserving in all targeted areas.
- Prioritizing development and sustainable projects alongside emergency response efforts.
- Broadening strategic partnerships with donors and civil society to ensure program sustainability and effectiveness.
- Enhancing institutional performance and embedding principles of transparency and accountability.



This report documents CRB’s key efforts and achievements over the past decade, showcasing the impact of its interventions on beneficiaries’ lives. It reflects CRB’s firm commitment to placing people first and upholding the values of relief, development, and sustainable progress in all targeted areas.

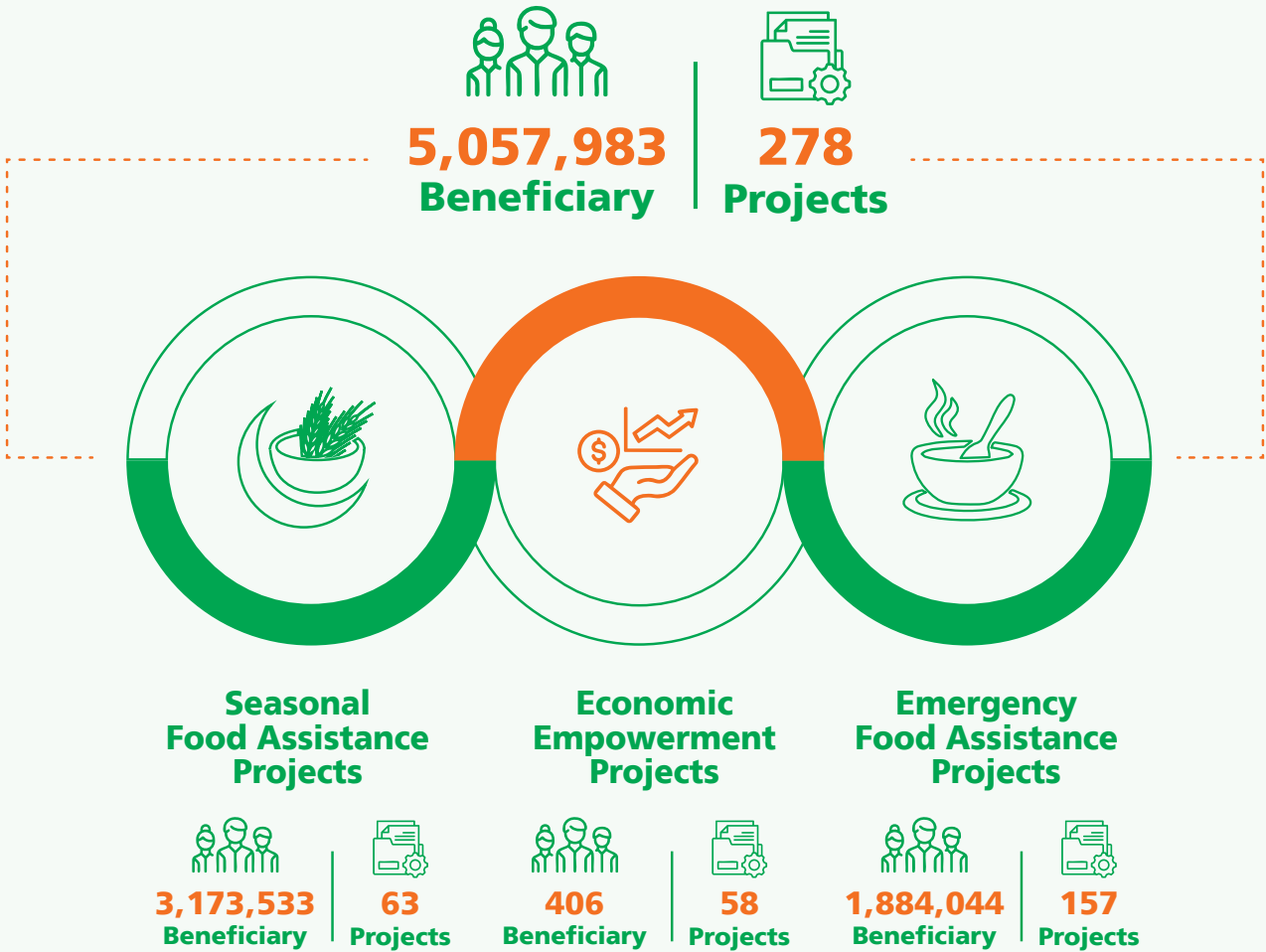







## Food Security and Livelihoods Sector (FSL)

# Food Security and Livelihoods

## Economic Empowerment Projects:

In the last three years, CRB gradually shifted its focus towards supporting livelihoods programs, including vocational training, provision of small production tools, and support for small family-run economic projects to enhance self-sufficiency and community resilience, implementing a total of 58 projects.



Economic empowerment projects form a fundamental pillar in the sustainable development, providing youth and women opportunities to transition from dependence on aid towards self-reliance. Over recent years, CRB has started to include vocational and entrepreneurial training, practical qualification enabling beneficiaries to acquire labor market skills, alongside supplying tools to help establish small projects that secure stable income.

This approach has contributed to improving beneficiaries' living conditions, increasing their capacity to withstand hardships, and effectively supporting the community's economic growth

## A Success Story:

### Little Support, Huge Impact: Amina's Story with CRB & YHF's Project



Amina Ahmed, a 57-year-old widow and mother of five, endured great hardship due to displacement and suffering. She says, "I felt like I became a mother again." These words reflect a journey from pain to hope.

Aminah lived a simple life in her village in Raimah Governorate, selling firewood to make a living. She recalls, "We lived modestly, working hard but managing our lives." But everything changed when war came close to their village.

Amina describes the crisis with visible emotion, "Prices skyrocketed, livelihoods collapsed, and conditions became unbearable. We had no choice but to flee." She and her children sought refuge at Jau Al-Naseem Camp in Marib, where they lived in a makeshift tent exposed to harsh weather conditions—sweltering heat by day and rain by night.

When heavy rains hit, they swept away what little hope remained. She says sadly, "The rain destroyed everything- the tent, our belongings, even the food we had." Every day, Aminah had to ask people for food. With tear-filled eyes, she adds, "Nothing hurts the heart like seeing your children sleep hungry, and being powerless, unable to help."

Cash assistance project proved to be a helping hand in a moment of despair. Financed by the Yemen Humanitarian Fund (YHF) and implemented by the Coalition of Relief and Building (CRB), the project gave Aminah a chance to stand again.

She recalls that moment: "The first time I received the money, I went to the market. I bought flour and a small oven. I baked bread with my own hands for my children. At that moment, I felt like I was a mother again, I felt alive and able to stand on my own feet."

Since that day, life has begun to stabilize. "The assistance meant more than money," Amina reflects. "It felt like someone was saying: 'We see your struggle, and you are not alone.'" Today, she uses the support to purchase food, water, and necessities for her children.

She says proudly, "I've regained my self-respect. I no longer have to ask people for help, and my children don't sleep hungry."

Despite the challenges, Aminah continues to resist, holding on to her dignity. She concludes with inspiring words: "Life is hard, but when I see my children fed and happy, I know there is still goodness in this world."

Aminah's story is not just that of a displaced mother but a living testament to how simple humanitarian aid can restore dignity to a woman and give her a chance to start anew.

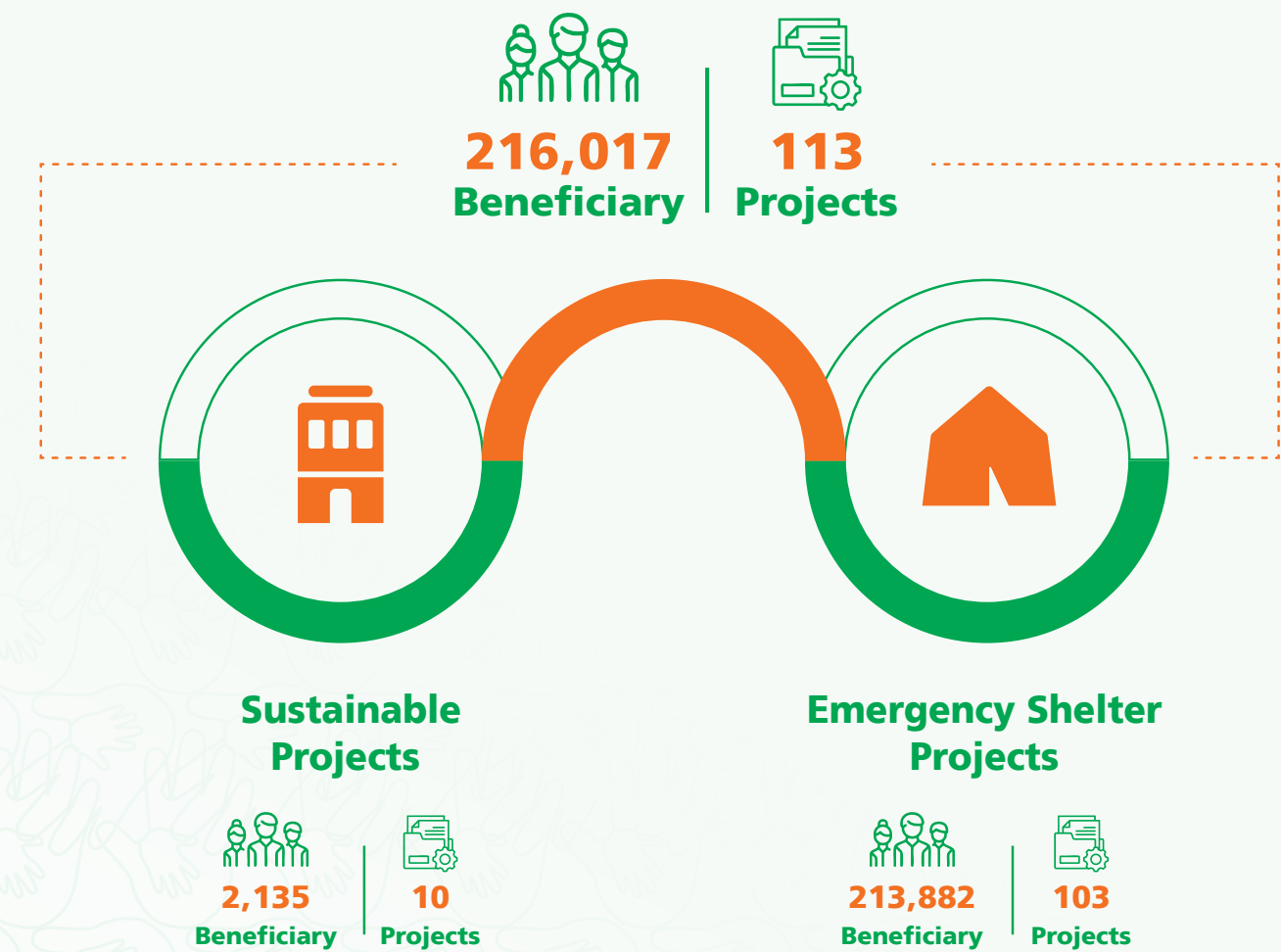






## Shelter and Non-Food Items

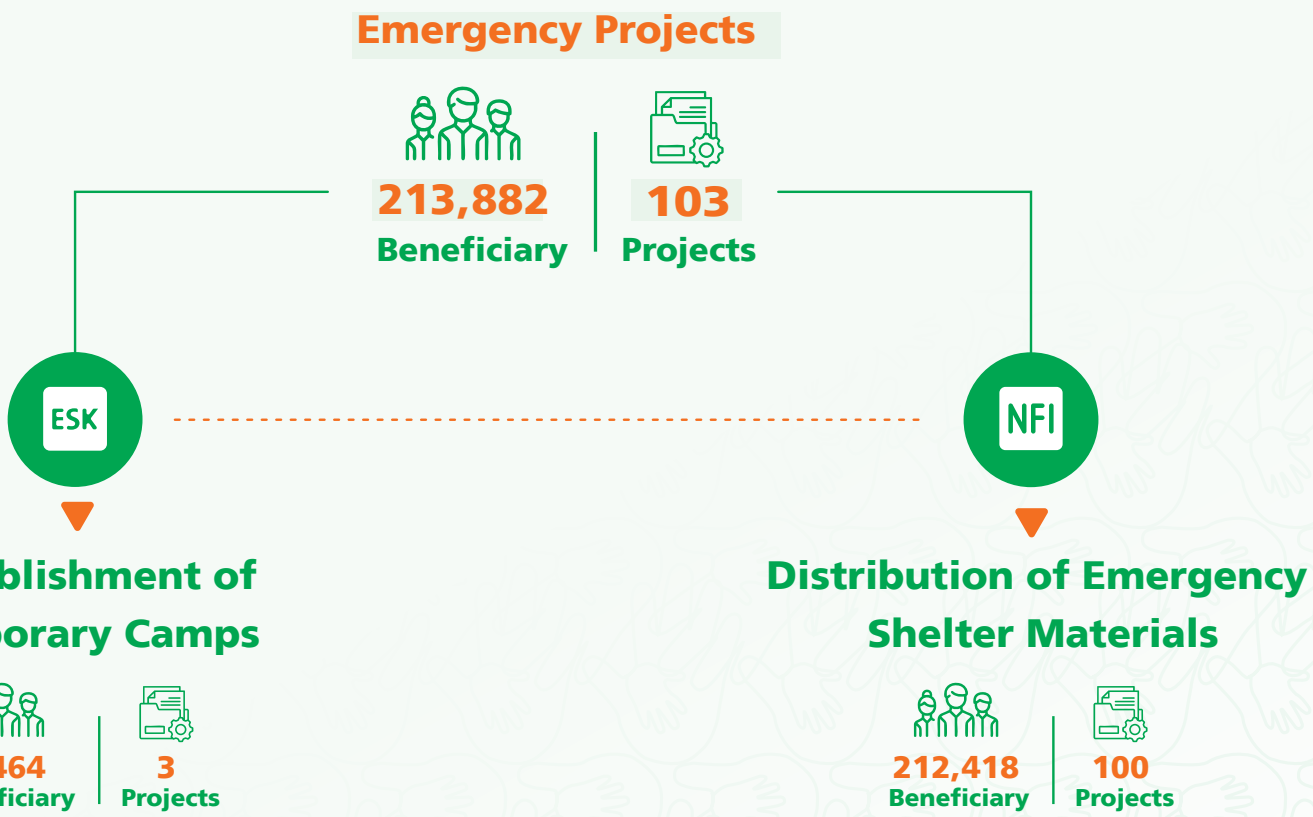
Distribution of Emergency Shelter Kits to Flood Victims

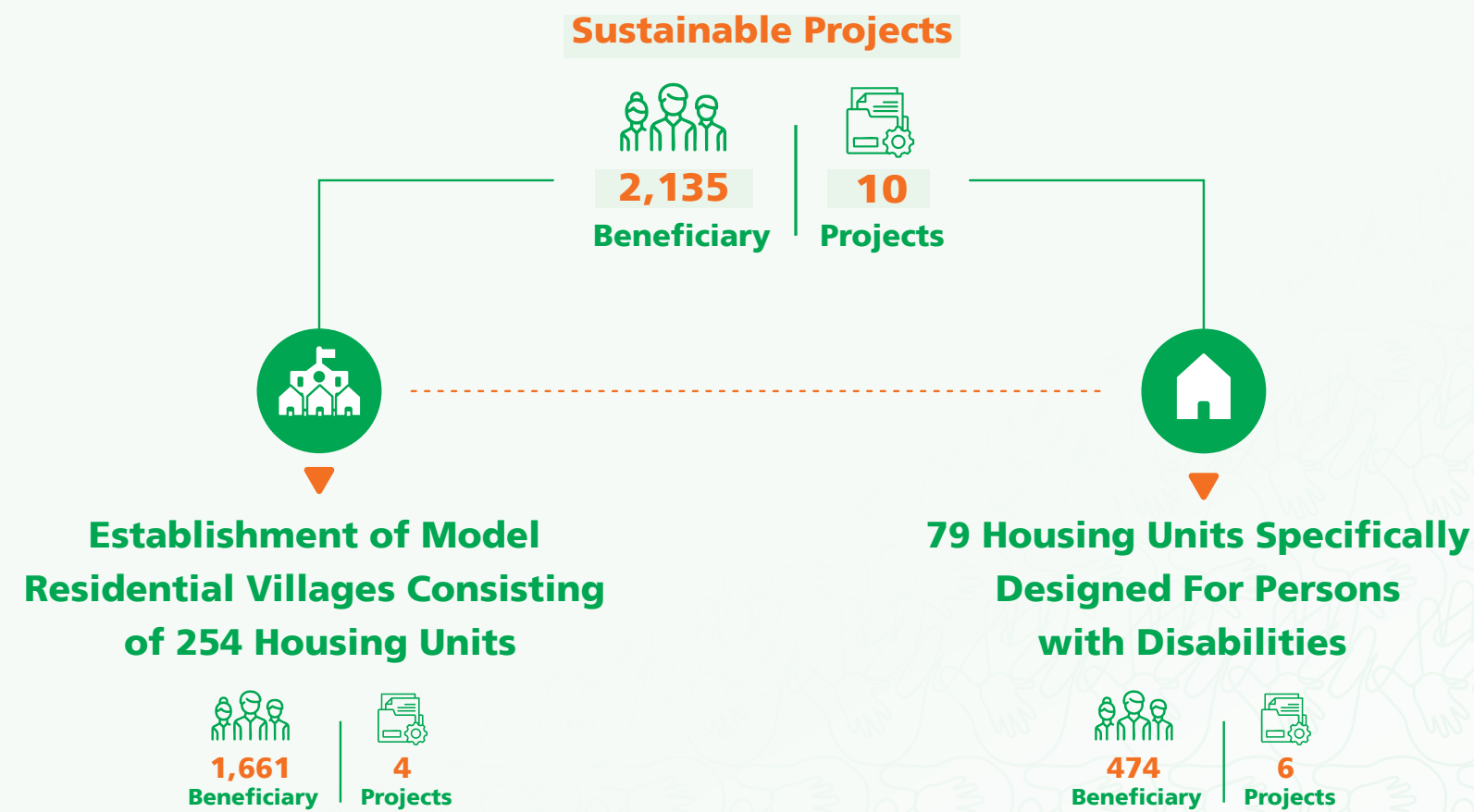




# Shelter and Non-Food Items

## A Success Story:

### Sustainable Housing Unit Restores Stability for Ali and His Family in Marib Camps

In a displacement camp in Marib Governorate, Ali—a man with a physical disability—lived with his family of six in a worn-out tent that offered no real shelter. The family struggled through harsh winters and scorching summers, making Ali’s physical and emotional pain even worse.

Due to his mobility impairment and inability to move independently, Ali was the most affected by the unsuitable living conditions. The tent could not protect him from the cold or extreme heat, which impacted his daily stability and quality of life.

Ali describes his severe suffering in the displacement tent before receiving his home, saying: “I went through tough times as the piercing winter cold seeped into my bones, forcing me to wear all my heavy clothes before bed.” He added: “We also suffered intense heat in summer, which affected my immobile body; I had to lie on the ground after spraying it with water due to the extreme heat.”

In response to this case and others like it, CRB provided a sustainable housing intervention in the form of a suitable residential unit consisting of two rooms,

a bathroom, and a kitchen. Constructed using bricks and reinforced concrete, it accommodates the needs of persons with disabilities and is equipped with basic services, funded by the World Assembly of Muslim Youth (WAMY).

Upon receiving the housing unit, Ali’s eyes filled with tears of joy. He expressed his happiness and gratitude, saying:

“My life has completely changed after moving into this home; it’s like a dream I never want to wake from. I no longer suffer from the cold or extreme heat, and today I feel safe and stable with my family.”

This story reflects the impact of sustainable shelter interventions in improving living conditions for the most vulnerable groups. It underscores the importance of integrating considerations for vulnerable populations into humanitarian programs, contributing to enhancing human dignity and long-term stability for displaced families.







Over the past decade, CRB has strengthened water security and public health in targeted communities through emergency and developmental programs that ensure access to safe water and improve sanitation services. The most vulnerable groups in displacement and disaster-affected areas were given special attention to enhance resilience and quality of life.

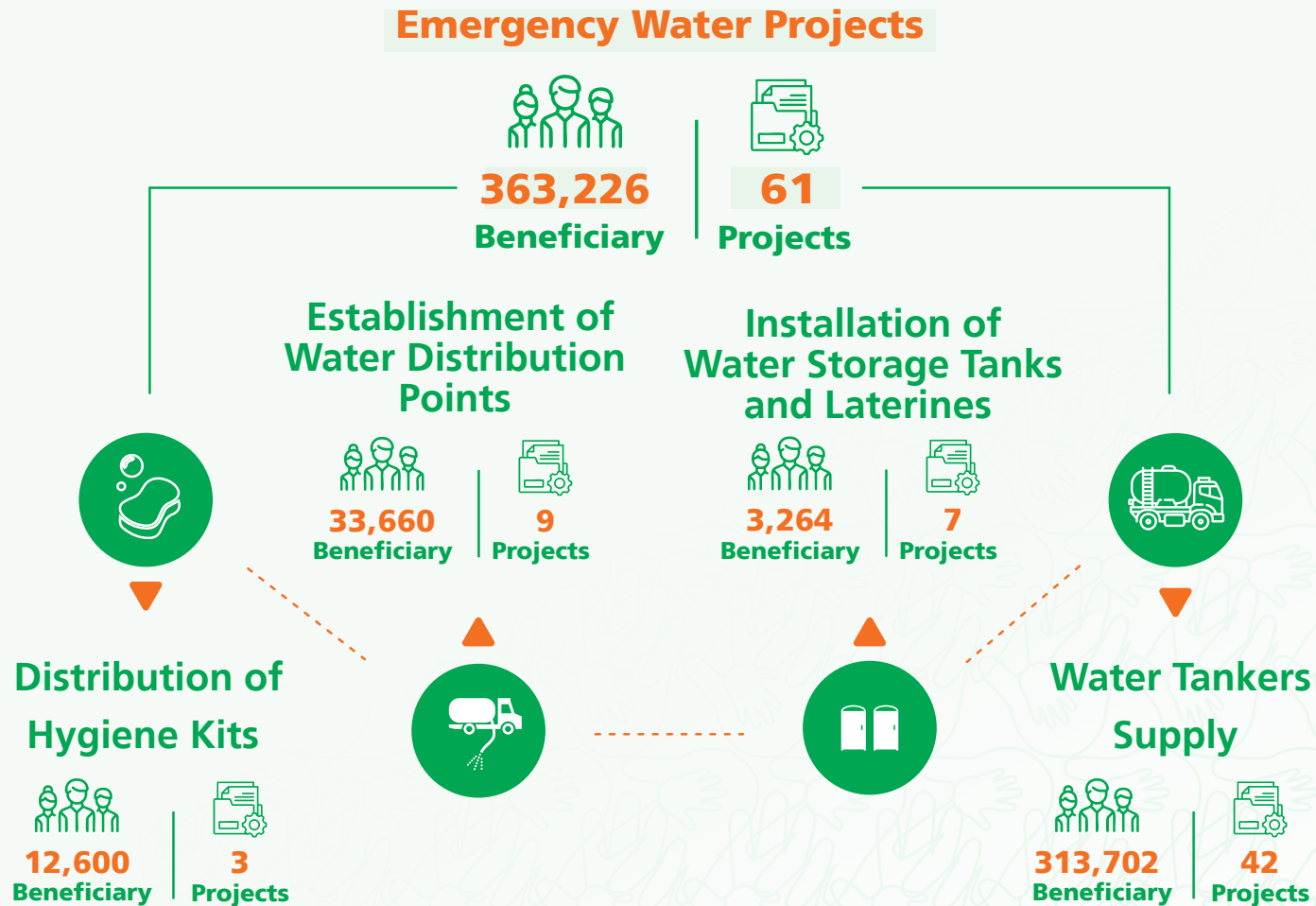




# Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene

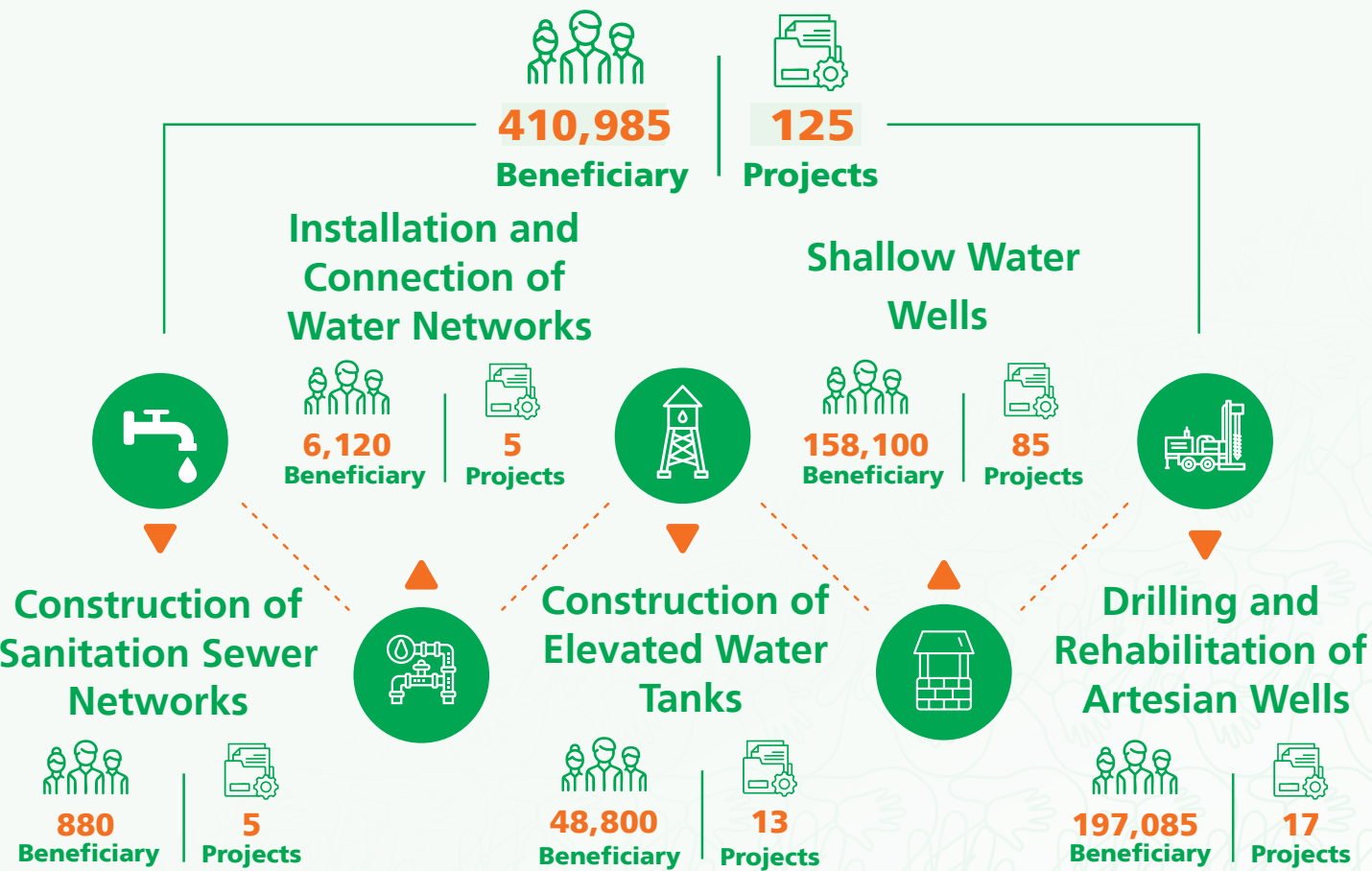

## A Success Story :

### Restoring Hope in Al-Qawz Camp – Rumaila, Marib

Access to water in Al-Qawz Camp for IDP's, presented a significant challenge for the residents. Ali Sharqi, a camp resident, shared his experience: "Before the project, we had to walk long distances to fetch water. The water we obtained was unsafe and caused many illnesses."

When Ali and his family arrived at the camp at the end of 2017, they faced these same difficulties. Ali's children had to travel far to collect water, facing road hazards and conflicts over water collection points.

However, relief came after long endurance. CARE International, in partnership with CRB, initiated a water well project in the camp. Though the project initially lacked a water tank (tower), efforts continued until a fully equipped water tank (tower), was installed along with water distribution networks extending to points within the camp, significantly improving residents' lives.

Ali added: "Because of the opportunities provided by the project, we now have a clean water network directly reaching our homes. We also benefited from health awareness campaigns that taught us how to keep water clean and avoid diseases. I thank everyone who contributed to this life-changing project."

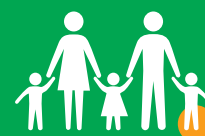

# Education Sector

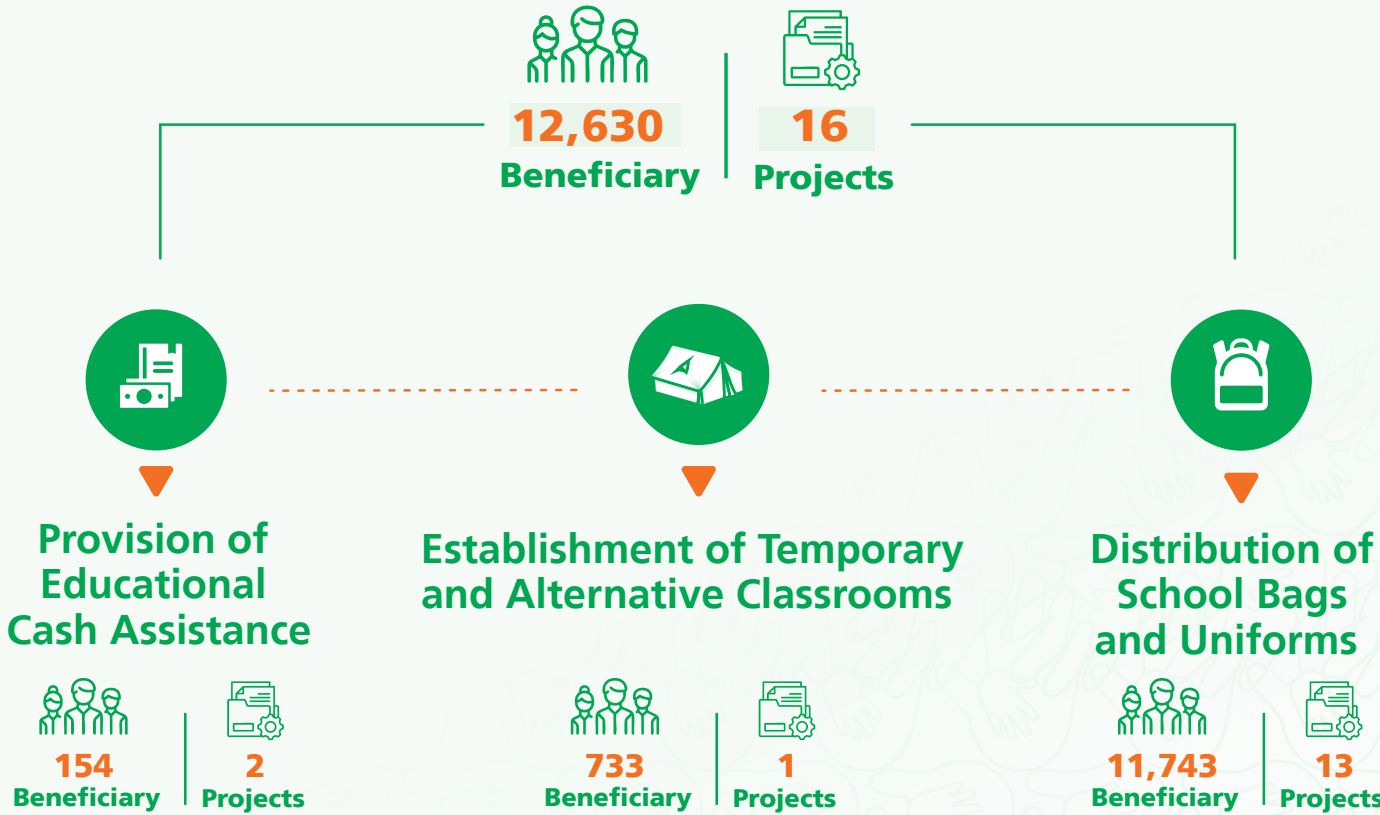
## Emergency Education Projects :

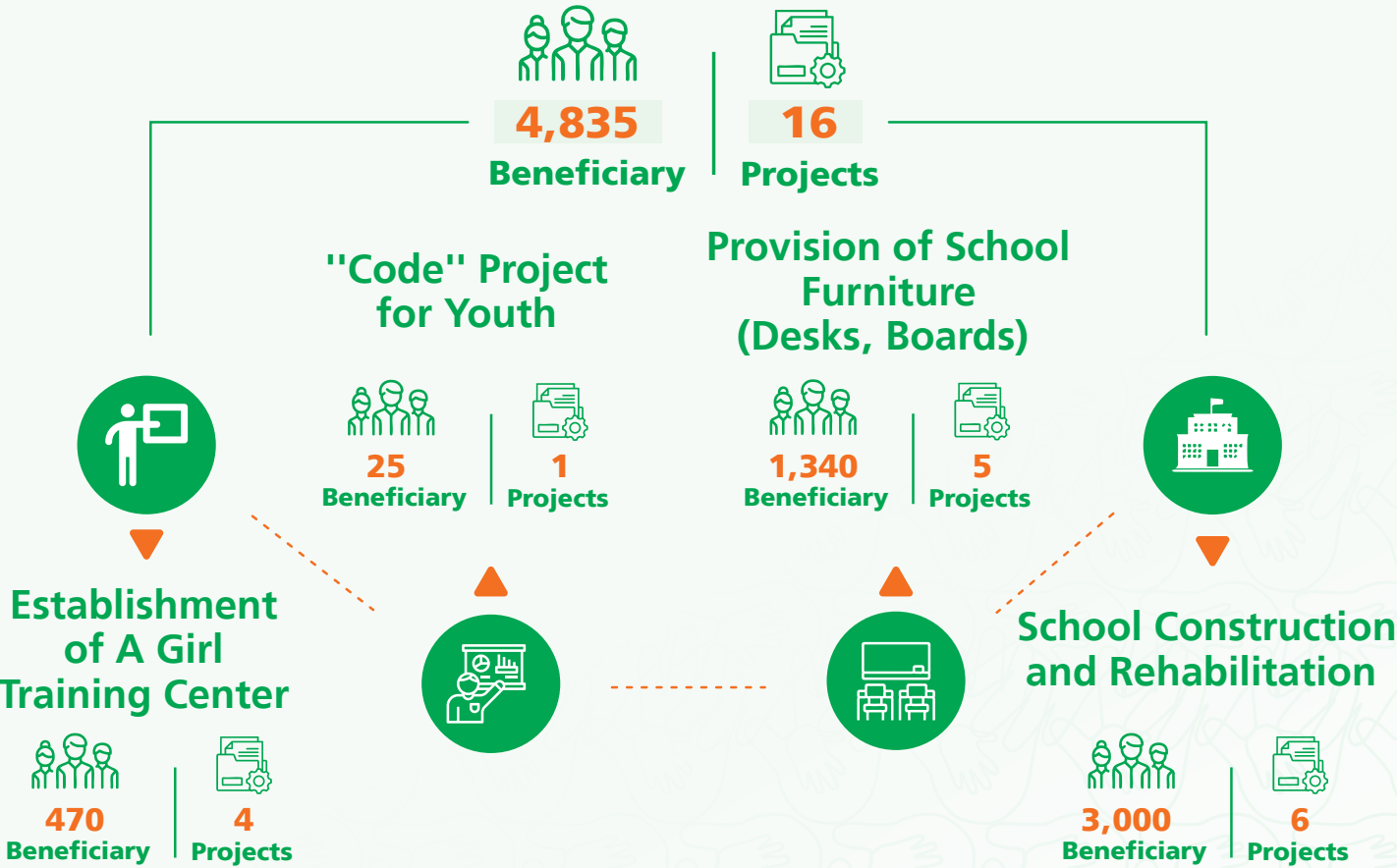

## A Success Story:

### From Tent to Classroom: Al-Zubairi School Opens Doors of Hope for Children of Al-Suwayda Camp – Marib.



In a country exhausted by war and torn apart by years of conflict, access to education has become one of the biggest challenges facing children, particularly in camps lacking even the most basic educational environments.

In Al-Suwayda Camp in Marib, hundreds of children received their education inside temporary tents under harsh conditions affected by high temperatures and sandstorms, threatening the continuity of quality education.

In response to this urgent need, the Coalition of Relief and Building (CRB), with support from the Türkiye Diyanet Foundation (Türkiye Diyanet Vakfı), implemented the Al-Zubairi model school project within the camp, a significant transformation in education for displaced children.

The project involved constructing 12 fully furnished classrooms with essential facilities, providing a safe and stable learning environment that preserves children's dignity and enhances their ability to learn and continue their education.

Eleven-year-old student Anoud Osman, expresses this transformation by saying:

“We used to study inside tents, but today we have real classrooms, chairs, and blackboards... I feel, now I can focus and dream of a better future.”

The project's impact extends beyond improving educational infrastructure; according to school administration reports, it has increased student attendance, enhanced the psychological environment for children, and strengthened displaced families' confidence in the importance of education despite displacement conditions.

Anoud resumes her story, her voice now filled with joy, describing her situation with a smile that lights up her face weary from the desert sun. She speaks of her new chairs and shiny blackboard, saying:

“I feel like I'm going to fly with joy. We have chairs, no sun or wind—I can hear the teacher and focus on the lessons. I won't miss school, and I'll achieve my dream of becoming a doctor.”

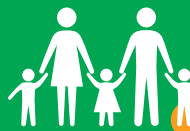

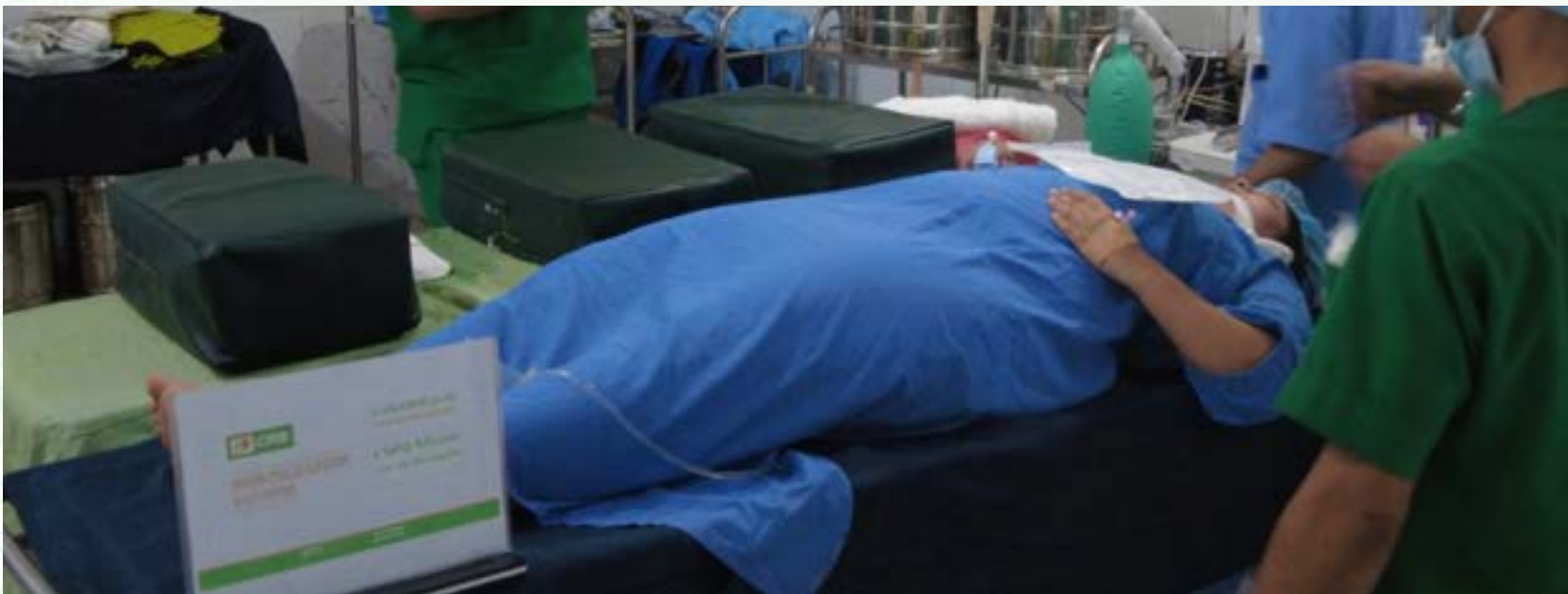
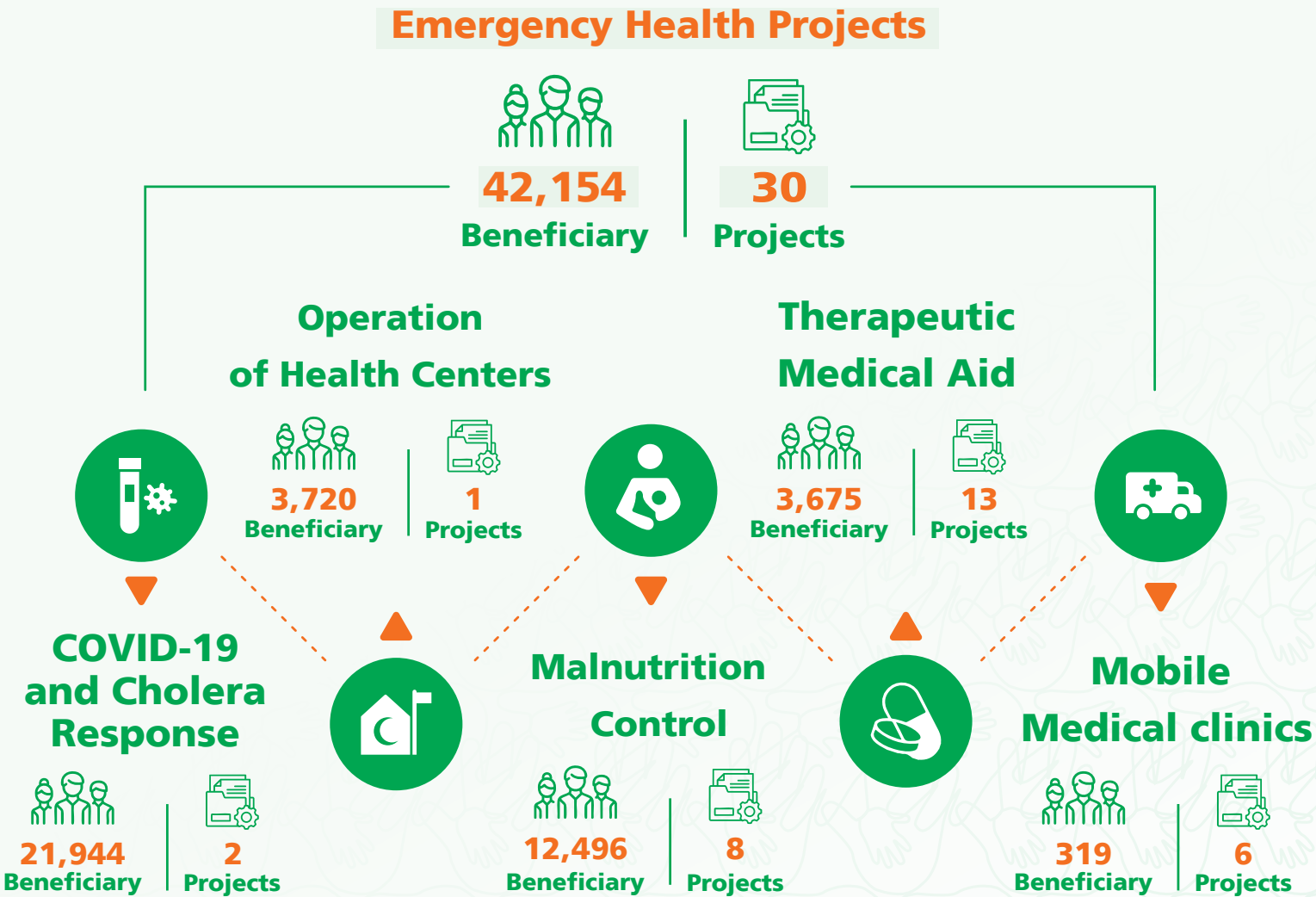




# Health Sector:

## Emergency Health Projects:

CRB has implemented urgent health interventions including mobile medical clinics in displacement camps, treatment of emergency medical cases, distribution of medicines and medical supplies to health centers, as well as awareness and rehabilitation activities for COVID-19 isolation centers. These efforts have significantly improved access to basic health services in the most underserved areas.







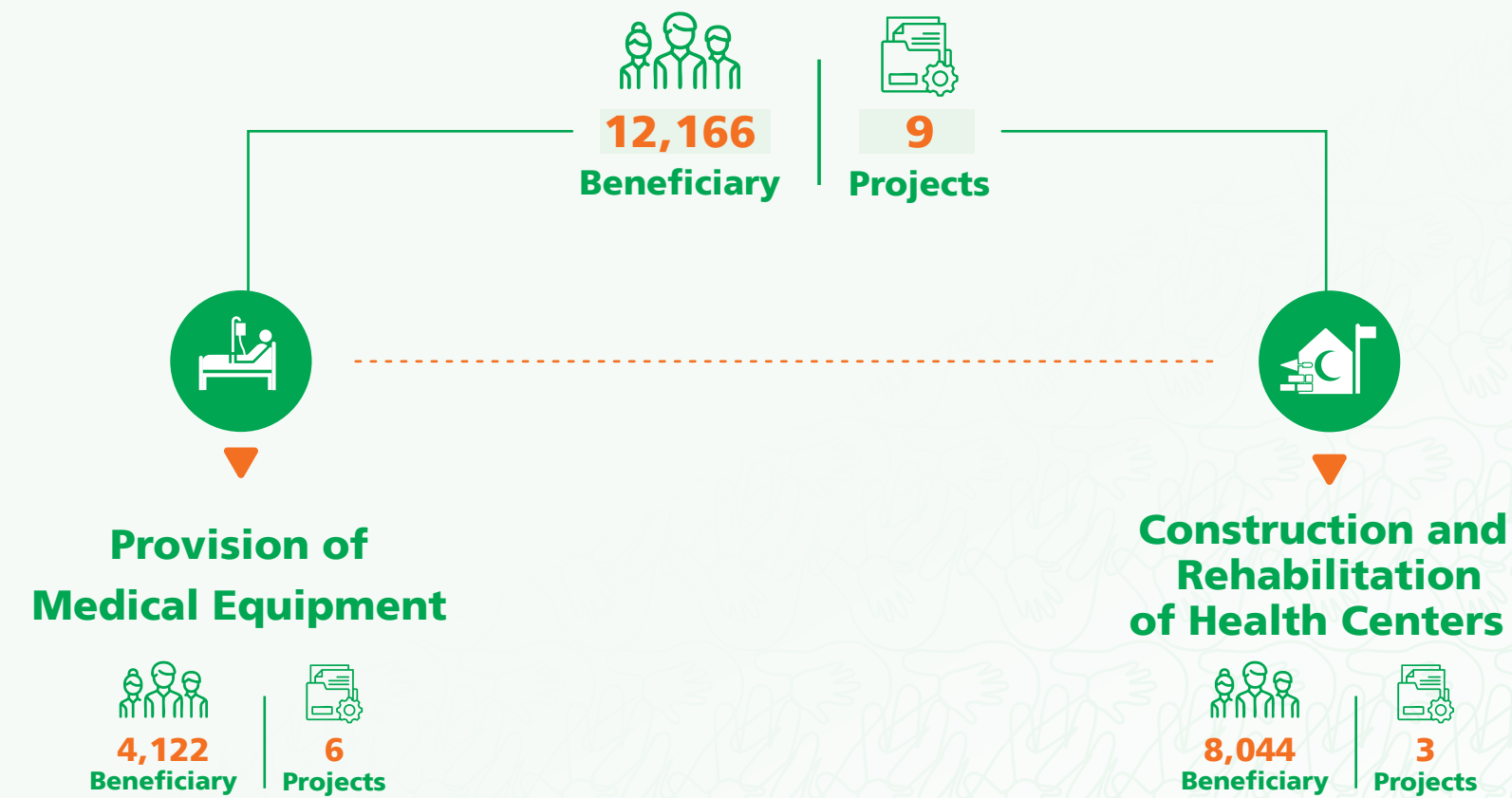

# A Success Story:

## A Hemodialysis Machine Restores Hope to Patients in Harib District

Patients suffering from kidney failure in Harib District, Marib, have long faced severe challenges due to a shortage of hemodialysis machines at Mohammed Al-Utair Hospital. This scarcity limited the hospital’s capacity to serve patients, forcing many to travel long distances for life-saving treatment and endure prolonged waiting times.

As the patients’ number in need of treatment sessions continued to increase, the gap widened between the growing demand and the limited capacity available. For some, their survival depended on the availability of a machine that might not be accessible when needed. The prolonged waiting times placed constant pressure on the medical staff and weighed heavily on families already burdened by the difficult living conditions brought about by the ongoing conflict.

Amid these challenges, CRB’s ntervention turned this crisis into a facility and brought an end to years of suffering. As part of its ceaseless efforts to support the health sector in the most affected areas, CRB provided Mohammed Al-Utair Hospital with a new hemodialysis machine that significantly enhanced the hospital’sability to serve the patients.

The new machine marked a major turning point. The hospital is now able to accommodate a greater number of patients and deliver regular dialysis sessions without long waiting lists or patients’ need to travel outside the district. Patients expressed deep happiness and gratitude, noting that the new machine has eased a burden that once dominated their daily lives.

Dr. Fahmi Al-Maslamani, the hospital’s director, described the support as “timely and critical,” emphasizing that the new machine would make a tangible difference in the hospital’s capacity to save lives and provide essential care for the growing number of kidney failure patients.

A story of prolonged suffering has now become a story of renewed hope—because of the humanitarian intervention that met an urgent need and improved the lives of many who once stood at the brink of danger.

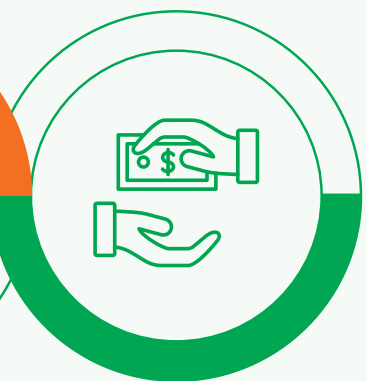

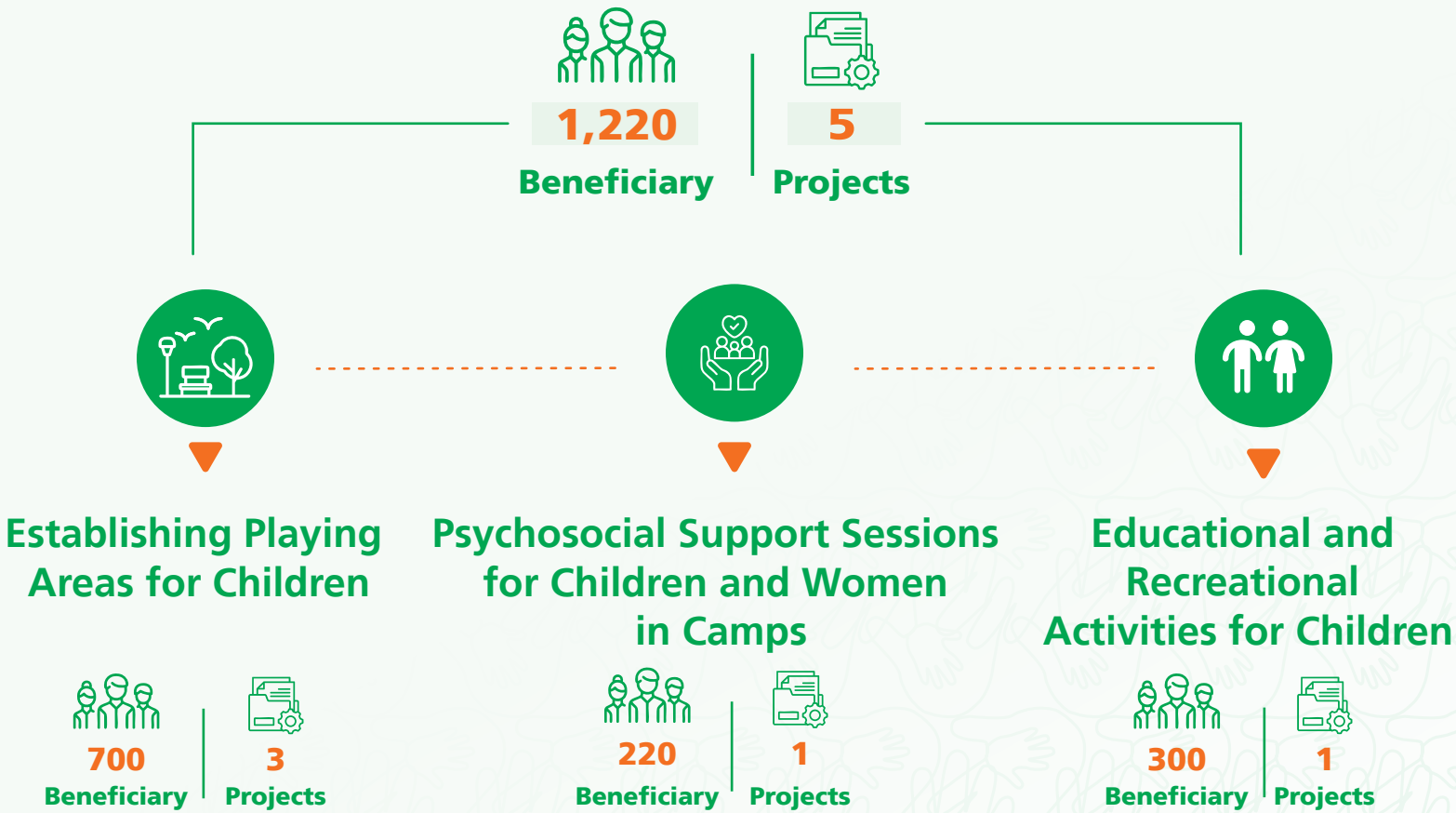


# Protection Sector

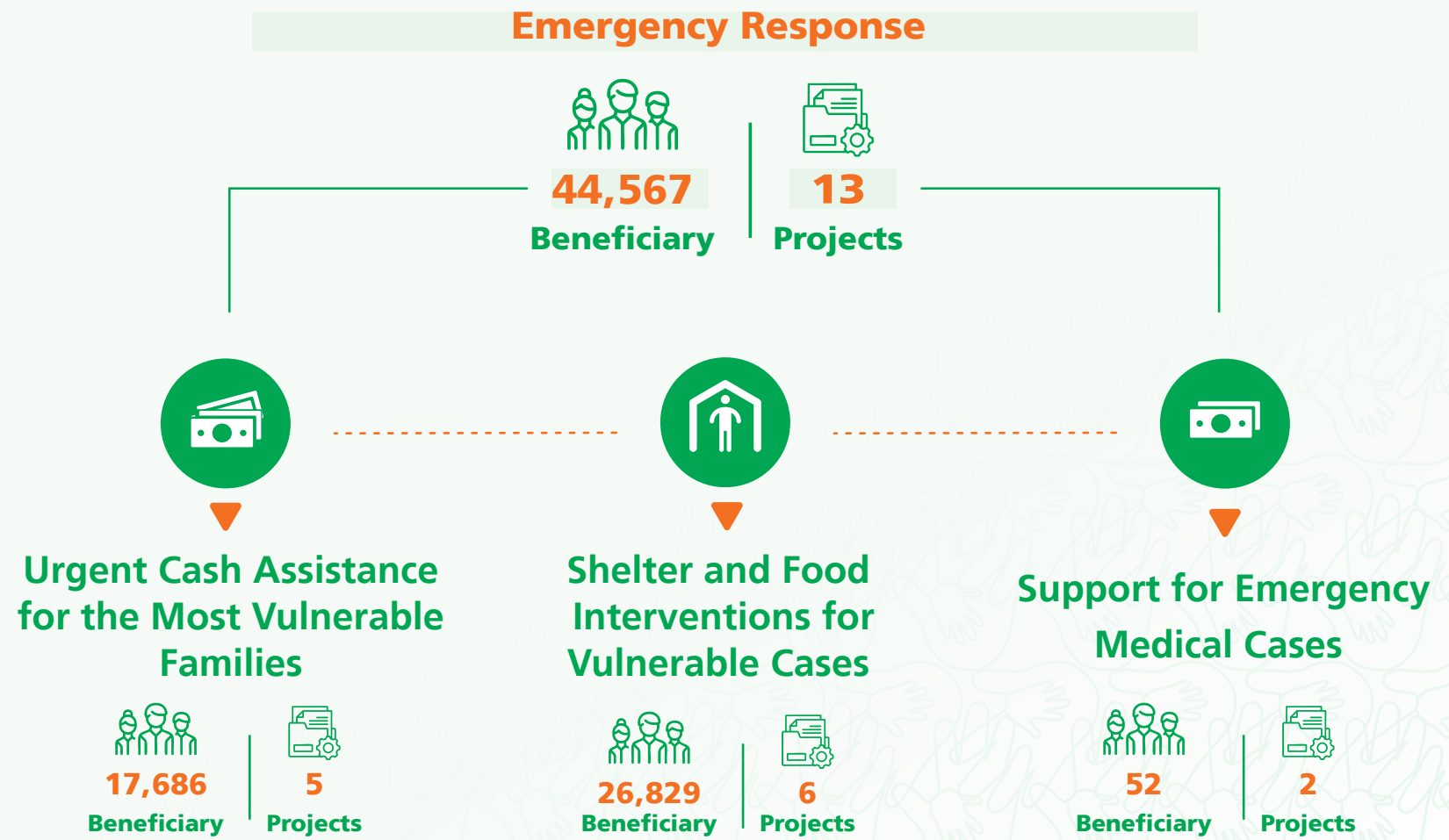

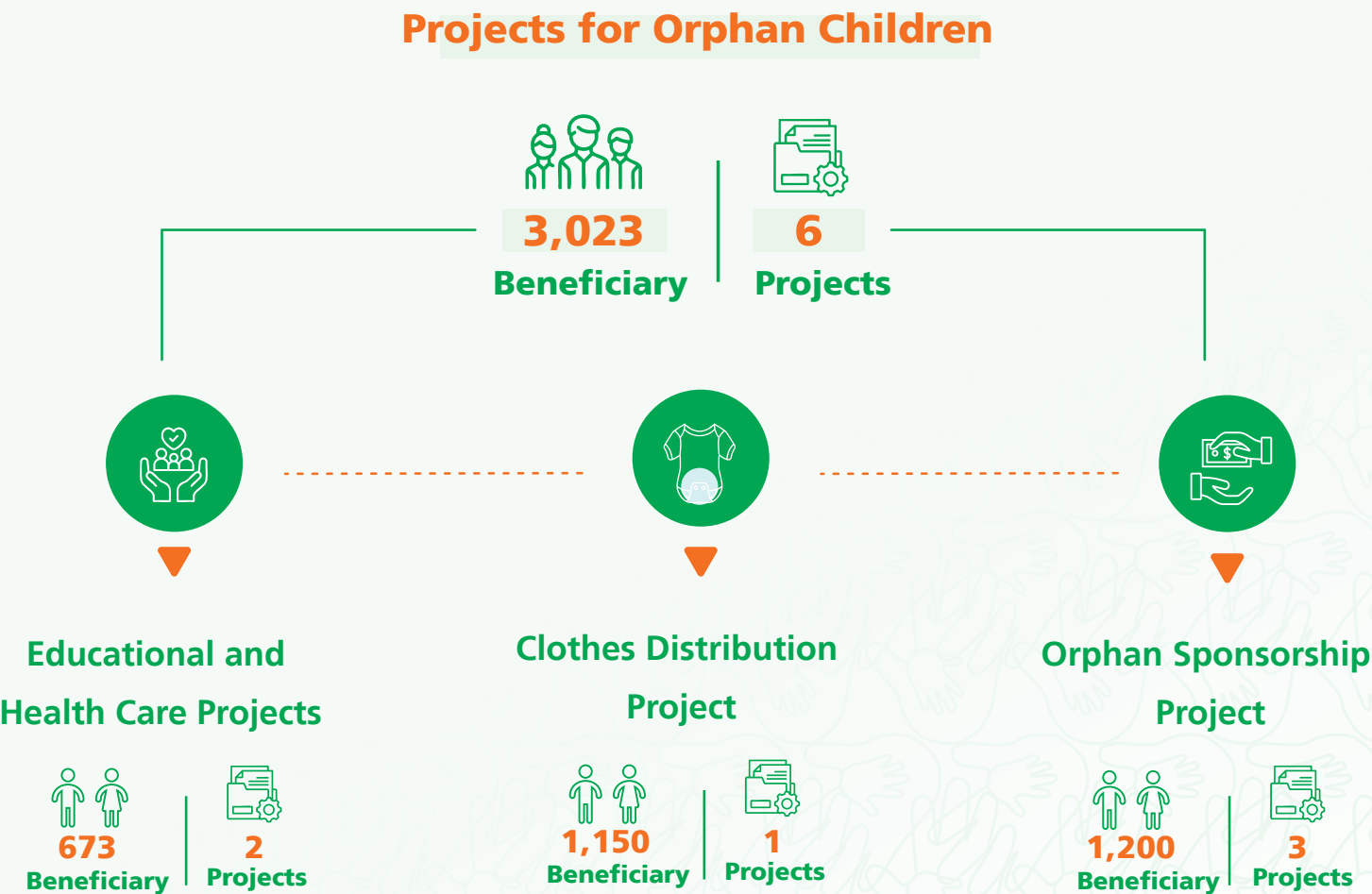




# Protection Sector

This ensures dignity and sustainability in meeting their core needs.







# Institutional Development and Partnerships

Over the past decade, CRB has undergone a transformative evolution from a nascent local organization into a prominent humanitarian and development actor with advanced operational capacity and a broad network of partnerships at both local and international levels.

This transformation reflects a balanced strategic approach that combines institutional modernization, operational efficiency enhancement, and building strong relationships with donors and international organizations. With this approach, CRB has successfully delivered both emergency and sustainable development interventions, positively impacting the lives of over six million beneficiaries through its programs and projects.

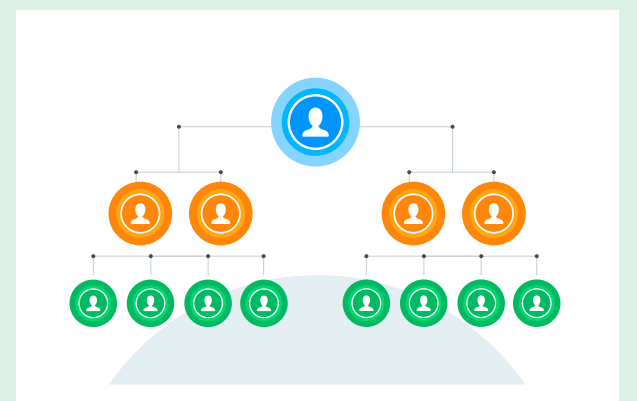
## First: Internal Capacity Building and Institutional Strengthening

This core area represents the foundation upon which CRB's success and sustained impact are built. It includes focused efforts on developing the administrative structure and operational systems according to international humanitarian standards.



### a. Administrative and Organizational Structure

- CRB operates through a Head office and three field offices in Marib, Aden, and Djibouti. The head office oversees operations and coordinate with authorities and partners.
- Number of Staff and Volunteers: CRB has employed 328 employees and volunteers.
- CRB structure encompasses specialized departments for programs, monitoring and evaluation, finance, human resource, partnerships, and media to ensure institutional performance.



### b. Institutional Systems and Policies

- CRB has adopted and updated 37 regulatory and operational policies, in according to local and international standards.
- CRB has implemented two strategic plans: the first (2016-2020) and the second (2021-2025), and is currently developing the third (2026-2029) to define priorities for institutional growth and sustainable development.
- CRB is transitioning towards automation of administrative and financial processes through advanced digital systems, including Microsoft 365, project management platforms and financial systems of Onyx Pro to enhance transparency and governance.



### c. Capacity Building and Professional Development

- CRB has conducted more than 102 training courses and workshops in key areas such as financial management, governance, monitoring and evaluation, beneficiary protection, proposal writing, and logistic operations.
- Staff participation in local and international development programs- supported by United Nations agencies and donor organizations- has strengthened technical and managerial competencies.





## Second; Institutional Growth and Expansion

This component shows the gradual growth that CRB has achieved in terms of geographical reach, project scope, and the number of beneficiaries served.



### a. Geographic Scope

- CRB has expanded its interventions to cover 19 Yemeni governorates, delivering high-quality humanitarian and development programs in key sectors such as food security, education, water and sanitation, protection, shelter and Non-food items, and livelihoods.



### b. Project Volume and Reach

- 672 emergency and development projects have been implemented over the past decade, funded by numerous international and regional partners, benefiting 6,168,983 individuals across multiple governorates.



### c. Expansion of Staff and Institutional Infrastructure

- Many offices, warehouses, and field operation centers have been established and equipped to enhance readiness and rapid response capacity.
- CRB has also established a specialized humanitarian media center staffed by experienced professionals dedicated to documenting humanitarian issues across governorates and supporting mobilization and advocacy.



### d. External Representation and Networking

- CRB undertook several international and regional visits to strengthen networking and foster relationships with donor agencies and humanitarian organizations. It also participated in numerous humanitarian conferences and seminars, contributing a realistic and up-to-date portrayal of Yemen's humanitarian situation to support coordinated efforts, partnership development, and effective responses.

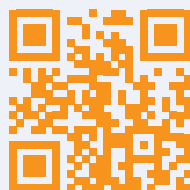
